Forklift License Hamilton - Within North America, getting forklift certification or a forklift license involves classroom and hands-on training. Regulatory control over certification, training and license for powered industrial truck operators falls under the jurisdiction of federal, state and provincial groups. Operators may obtain a license either through training administered by the employer or by a third party. In any case, regulatory requirements need to be met. Recertification is necessary every two to three years.

The lift truck is a powered industrial equipment that is designed along with many alternatives, like for example sit-down and stand-up models, propane and electric versions, and various types and sizes to meet the industrial requirements of employees. Operator training programs are normally individualized to be able address the specific uses and types for which the operator is training. Training on a sit-down, gas-powered forklift in a warehouse setting would not be the same as training on a stand-up, propane-powered lift truck within a shipyard. The variety of lift trucks and their uses makes it impossible to establish universal licensing requirements for all industries and equipment. Regulatory standards, therefore, have a tendency not to focus on particular program requirements but instead on the outcome of individual training programs.

On the job training which is supplied by the employer is the most common form of forklift training certification and licensing. The employer who offers this method of certification is needed to offer classroom sessions and practical training on machinery at their place of work. Employers can choose to train staff on every kind of forklift separately, or to train them on all equipment combined. The program incorporates lift truck operation procedures, safety procedures, company regulations and lift truck maintenance. Subject matters specific to the worksite, such as dangerous materials or conditions, should be included. Following classroom learning, operators are taught how to safely use and operate each and every type of forklift on the worksite.

When using a third party trainer, the certification process will normally consist of an on-site component with hands-on practice.

It must be noted that employer-provided certifications do not transfer from one employer to the next. Receiving a lift truck license through employer-provided training permits the operator to operate a forklift for that employer only.

The most significant factor of lift truck license training is forklift safety. The exact safety training requirements differ from one kind of machinery to another. Safety problems vary from industry to industry and from employer to employer. Both third-party providers and employer-provided training may have to deal with additional requirements for safety training in applicable industries, like in marine and offshore uses.
